Council member wins Cozad's mayor post

COZAD—Nancy Meyer, who has served as a member of the Cozad City Council for 12 years, will become the mayor of the municipality in December. She will fill the position for the next four years, succeeding Greg Tetley who did not seek re-election. Meyer defeated Brian Woldt, the Dawson County Emergency Management director, during the general election 471-405.—reported in the Tri-City Trib.

BROKEN BOW—Members of the Custer Campus Board of Directors and Custer Economic Development Corporation officially broke ground on the site of the new seven-acre Custer Campus in Broken Bow on Friday, Nov. 5. Among officials taking part in the ceremony were Sen. Ben Nelson and Lt. Gov. Rick Sheehy. The \$1.5 million campus is located on the west edge of Broken Bow along Highway 2, across from Pamida.—reported in the Custer County Chief.

Third time is no charm for Ogallala school bond

OGALLALA—The third time was not a charm for voters to endorse a bond issue to improve the Ogallala Public Schools. For the third time in 14 months, voters said no to the \$14.5 million bond proposal which would have included an expansion to Prairie View Elementary School, a demolition of the older portion of the Ogallala Middle School, a small addition and the construction of a bus barn. Voters voiced their opinions which would have added 16.7 cents per \$100 of property valuations.—reported in the Keith County News.
