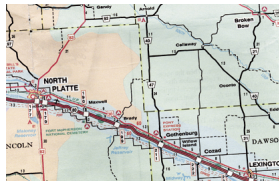

Warm up ovens for 43rd annual cake auction

COZAD—Members of the Cozad Jaycees have been finalizing plans for the 43rd Annual March of Dimes (MOD) Cake Auction under the direction of Phyllis Gengenbac, chairman. The event will be staged at Chipper Hall on Feb. 10. This year marks the 43rd anniversary for the auction. Since its beginning in 1968, approximately \$145,000 has been generated for the MOD. Since the cake auction was moved to Chipper Hall three years ago, the response has boosted and usually attracts over 350 cakes.—reported in the Tri-City Trib.

Business expands despite economy woes

CURTIS—A sausage-making business is expanding its capabilities in the Eustis area, despite the recent economy woes. Gregg Wolf, owner of Lone Wolf Würst Meats, who has been making handmade sausages of many varieties since 1985, plans to expand his business to the west side of Eustis. Wolf is hoping construction of the new facility will be started by this spring as the plant has been producing over 800 pounds a week with another plant in McPherson making 2,000 pounds a month, and a total of 5,000 pounds were shipped across the nation over the Christmas holiday, showing the need for expanding.—reported in the Frontier County Enterprise.

Arnold lake chosen for restoration project

ARNOLD—Arnold Recreation's lake was one of two lakes in the area chosen for a restoration project, estimated at around \$250,000. The lake qualified for the Aquatic Habitat Stamp funding for restoration and access improvement activities which includes proceeds from state habitat and hunting/fishing permits. Although the project is a sure thing, the exact plan has not yet been finalized but hopes are to improve fishing at the area, widening the boat dock, redoing the outlet, dredging and deepening the lake, and tree and vegetation removal.—reported in the Arnold Sentinel.
