BROKEN BOW—A massive grass fire broke out eight miles west of Thedford on Good Friday, and with visions of 1999 still looming on his mind, Thedford Fire Chief Russ Riser didn't mess around and called for reinforcements. By the time the fire was over, 28 fire departments had answered the call. Two firemen were hurt and at least two ranchers took refuge in a stock tank while the fire burned over the top of them. The fire was described as "just plain awful," "horrible," and "freaky." The wind kept rolling the fire back across the black area, according to Riser, with a total of 11,000 acres burned. Cause of the massive blaze was blamed on conditions and an UTV (Ultra Terrain Vehicle).—reported in the Custer County Chief.

Sunday liquor ban temporarily lifted

CALLAWAY—A trial balloon on Callaway's Sunday liquor sales ban was launched on April 19. The Village Board of Trustees voted three-to-two to lift the ban on a trial basis during the hours of 3-10 p.m., from now to Oct. 1, after a special meeting which included but rejected a compromise proposal. Some 30 people packed the meeting room to voice opinions for or against and the line appeared to be drawn between traditionalists in favor of retaining the ban on moral grounds and those seeking a more liberal policy favoring businesses. With an overwhelming majority speaking out in favor of lifting the ban, a trial period was the best compromise for the moment.—reported in the Callaway Courier.
