BROKEN BOW—The Village of Ansley will soon be getting a new wastewater treatment facility, thanks to a Community Development Block Grant. The Nebraska Department of Economic Development has awarded \$350,000 in CDBG funding to the Village of Ansley to build a new wastewater facility due to most of the original equipment approaching or surpassing lifespan capabilities and the institution of new regulations. Additional funding through the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality’s State Revolving Loan Fund will help complete the project.—reported in the Custer County Chief.

#### BB machine to improve quality by quantity

CALLAWAY—Jump and free throw shooters will now be able to shoot high volumes of basketballs without having to waste much time going for rebounds with a new ball return machine at the Callaway High School gym. The \$5,000 device looks a bit like a Rube Goldberg invention with its high, square net surrounding the basket. The shooter can take as many shots as they like from any angle on the court and the balls are funneled into the ball return which are then passed back to the shooter.
