Large local marijuana operation busted

OGALLALA—Local law enforcement authorities recently confiscated approximately \$500,000 worth of marijuana that was grown in the midst of several Keith County farmers' corn crops, according to Keith County Deputy Attorney Neleigh Korth. Three men, one from Maxwell and two from Lemoyne, have been arrested and each are charged with a Class 3 felony possession with intent to distribute a controlled substance. Investigators discovered six or seven plots involving several different landowners and farmers. The marijuana was found during an aerial surveillance, and due to the large amount, federal authorities have been notified.—taken from the Keith County News.
