Gas leak, fire force two school evacuations

OGALLALA—For the second time in a week, an Ogallala Public School building was evacuated. On Monday, Oct. 12, a custodian in the Ogallala High School alerted Principal Dan Hadden that the smell of gas could be detected in the boiler room. The custodian got in touch with an official from the gas company who instructed him to evacuate the building. The gas leak was found to have come from an old water heater, soon to be replaced, and the all clear was given. On Oct. 6, Progress Elementary School students and staff were evacuated because of a fire in the ventilation system in the kitchen. Damage was minimal and no one was injured.—taken from

H1N1 Flu reported in Frontier County

CURTIS—The H1N1 strain of influenza has officially arrived in Frontier County. According to Terry Gourley of the Curtis Medical Center, there were six confirmed cases identified on Oct. 12 with more expected to be confirmed. Medicine Valley Superintendent Alan Gary stated that 20 high school students were absent Oct. 12, but it was unknown how many of those absentees were related to the flu.—taken from the Frontier County Enterprise.

Early storm breaks 1896 snow record

ARNOLD—With harvesting already delayed, records were set around the area as Arnold recorded a whopping 12-inches of snow on Oct. 9 and 10, breaking records from 1896. Arnold also set a record low temperature of 17 degrees. First snowfalls of the season usually occur in November and over 10-inches had not been seen in the last 10 years with less than two inches being normal, 12 inches of snow dates back to the regional record set in 1896.—taken from the Arnold Sentinel.
