Trent Esch was charged as the result of an incident that occurred March 18 in which a deputy sheriff’s vehicle was shot at multiple times. The vehicle was parked and unoccupied at the deputy’s home at the time of the shooting. Esch turned himself into authorities and was booked into the Custer County Jail after being treated for injuries he sustained when he tried to jump out of a vehicle being driven by a family member who was transporting him to jail for surrender.—reported in the Custer County Chief.

CURTIS—The empty old “Bearly Nuff” building, located about a quarter mile north of the railroad tracks on Highway 83 in Wellfleet, is about to come back to life. Tony Jolliffe and Dawn Sampeck-Jolliffe of the Triple “C” Restaurant in Curtis will be opening the business called the Triple “C” Too. A convenience store will be located at the front of the building and a cafe, which will seat 80 people, will be towards the back. Cheer squad, school district still far apart

CALLAWAY—Since both Arnold and Callaway Schools had announced discontinuing cheerleading squads as a sanctioned school activity, not everyone is in agreement including some board members. However, a return of cheer squads to South Loup sporting events seemed to dim and a patron effort to form a non-sanctioned squad is in limbo. The District 180 Board of Education voted 3-3 on two school liability release forms which would have allowed for permission of a non-school sponsored cheer squad to perform at home games and matches, but the tie vote had killed the motion.—reported in the Callaway Courier.
