Messersmith also peddled the most her junior year, earning \$3,351 in sales. FFA advisor Dan Scherer said the previous record was a little more than \$3,000.

The other day, Messersmith shared her secret weapon.

“You go to people who know you and like you,” she said.

And not only in Gothenburg.

Messersmith traveled to the nearby communities of Cozad, Oconto, Callaway, North Platte and Cambridge every weekend and after school.

She said she's also patient.

“You need to let your customers take their time in deciding what they want to buy,” Messersmith said.

Delivering her product in timely fashion also helped in building a customer base as did calling back to see if her customers liked their product.

She also sent hand-written thank-you notes.

“I wanted to let them know how much I appreciated their purchase,” Messersmith said.
