Cozad hospital benefits from USDA grant

COZAD—Hard work pays off for the City of Cozad as they were the recent recipient of a \$130,000 grant. The grant will be used to assist Cozad Community Hospital with purchasing a 4D Ultrasound/Doppler machine for improved prenatal care. Presenting the grant was USDA Nebraska Director Maxine Moul, to Cozad Mayor Nancy Meyer and Cozad Community Hospital Administrator Lyle Davis.—reported in the Tri-City Trib.

BROKEN BOW—One building in downtown Omaha has been given a facelift, and an entire neighborhood a burst of color, thanks to the artistic talents of a Custer County native. Craig Lee, originally of Broken Bow, son of Donald and Roberta Lee and longtime owners of Lee's Variety Store in Ansley, received a degree at UNL in studio painting and drawing. He has recently finished a 62'x18'6" mural on 35th and Center Street that depicts a spring/summer neighborhood theme. CALLAWAY—Members of Callaway Fire Department have been kept busy. A fire on July 29 near the county line south of Callaway that was out had flared back up on July 30, and Callaway was called out to assist at a grass fire near Tryon. Oconto and Callaway departments converged on the grass fire near the Cozad County Road the evening of July 30, and Callaway also sent up two grass rigs and crews to help at Tryon. The area recently received some rain but grasslands remain very dry.—reported in the Callaway Courier.
