Haymaker star inducted into Hall of Fame

COZAD—Having a standout high school and college athletic career was noted for former Haymaker Corey Arndt, as he was recently inducted into the Chadron State College Athletic Hall of Fame. Arndt was a force on the mat for the Eagles as he was pinned just four times during his four-year college career. One of Arndt's highlights occurred when he was a sophomore at Cozad when he won by a pin using a headlock against a Kearney wrestler and helping his team win the dual. Arndt qualified for the NCAA Division II National Tournament, and had a 34-2 record in Class B at the state tournament as a senior at Cozad High School. He is the son of Shelley Arndt of Cozad and the late Tom Arndt.—reported in the Tri-City Trib.

Helicopters utilized for wind farm high wires

BROKEN BOW—A key component to the Broken Bow Wind Farm operation, a nine mile long 115,000-volt transmission line planned and built by Nebraska Public Power, is completed and energized. To help accomplish the task were helicopters out of Rapid City, SD. The helicopters made attaching bird flight diverters quicker than utilizing other equipment. The bird flight diverters mark the line to avoid collisions with the power line and are attached to the top line of the transmission line, called an overhead shield wire. Overhead power lines were also equipped with a ground conductor that was grounded at the top to minimize the likelihood of direct lightning strikes.—reported in the Custer County Chief.

MRNRD among group purchasing 19,518 acres

CURTIS—The Middle Republican Natural Resource District, in conjunction with three other Nebraska Natural Resource Districts recently entered into an agreement to purchase 19,518 acres for \$83 million. Of that ground 15,800 acres is irrigated. The purchase was made in response to the NRDs' requirement to come into compliance with the Republican River Water Compact. The land purchase is located in Lincoln County, and of that 10,400 of the irrigated acres are located within the Middle Republican NRD, with another 5,360 in the Twin Platte NRD. Closing of the sale is expected within the next 30 days.—reported in the Frontier County Enterprise.

Penny war to benefit local food pantry
