Community Hospital announces new addition

The new service will allow patients to receive radiation in McCook at the Community Hospital as part of their cancer treatment. The enhancement to access of radiation oncology services will have a positive impact for patients in the region. Initial plans have been drawn for a 4,200 square-foot radiation oncology center on the east side of the Medical Specialists Center that will include two large exam rooms, a waiting room and a spacious reception area as well as some added parking areas.—reported in the Frontier County Enterprise.

Arnold resident cited for WWII war effort

ARNOLD—Senior resident Frances Marie Scott will turn 91 on March 31, and she was recently awarded the Rosie the Riveter Association's certificate to recognize her part in helping the war effort during World War II. Scott was trained to fill 1,000 pound bombs with explosives at the Grand Island Ordinance Plant. She was required to wear safety clothing including denim coveralls, gloves and safety shoes as the explosive materials would burn the skin if touched. She served at the facility from November 1942 to August 1944.—reported in the Arnold Sentinel.

Stark contrasts greet local missionary

CALLAWAY—Lifelong rural Callaway man Monty Birnie recently joined a growing list of travelers to Northeast India for missionary work. Birnie helped to fit poor rural villagers with reading glasses and to distribute water filters. He joined six other missionaries for the trip Jan. 17-27. According to Birnie, there are stark contrasts from the U.S. as the people are extremely poor and are typically workers on large tea and rice plantations, but who were extremely kind and giving despite having little. Members of the Callaway Community Church helped Birnie with funds needed when he accepted a place on the missionary team.—reported in the Callaway

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
