### Elevator explosion injures woman

**COZAD**—An elevator explosion at the Dawson Feeders northeast of Lexington broke up the silence and sounds of the country recently. Injured was Zellidhay Villatoro as she was burned by a fireball that traveled down the elevator shaft to the bottom where she was working. Villatoro was transported to the Lexington Regional Hospital before being flown to Saint Elizabeth Regional Medical Center for treatment of extensive burns. The nearly 70-year-old structure has undergone many upgrades to become a usable feed mill. According to the state fire marshal, the explosion happened at the top of the elevator from a buildup of grain dust. The upper portion of the building was destroyed by the blast, but it did not cause a fire.—reported in the Tri-City Trib.

**BROKEN BOW**—A new guide to Broken Bow is a collaborative effort between the Broken Bow Chamber of Commerce, Custer County Tourism and the Custer County Chief, “Broken Bow 2013” and is an 80-page full color guide to the community. ### Surplus SAFE boat to assist in water rescues

**OGALLALA**—The Keystone-Lemoyne Volunteer Fire Department recently acquired a SAFE boat, which will be used for water rescues. The SAFE (Secure All-around Flotation Equipped) boat is surplus from the Coast Guard and had been in service on the Atlantic Ocean off the Florida coast. It is a 23-foot aluminum vessel with 150-horsepower motors and is virtually unsinkable. The department is home to the county's Dive Rescue Team as well, and on average are called into service eight times a year, mainly on Lake McConaughy, but they will also assist neighboring departments in need.—reported in the Keith County News.
