

A Broken Bow elementary teacher has been hired as a new Dudley Elementary principal.

During a special meeting early Thursday morning, the District 20 board hired Allison Jonas to fill a position which will be vacated at the end of the school year.

One of the two Dudley principals, Teresa Messersmith, will be the new special education director for Lexington Public Schools next year.

Jonas said she wanted the job because Gothenburg has always had a reputation for having an excellent school system.

"After interviewing, it was apparent that the system is not only excellent but exceptional," she said. "The staff, administration, students and community are all top-notch and our family is honored and excited to be a part of it."

For the past six years, Jonas has taught science and language arts to sixth graders. She's also the school improvement coordinator and secondary response- to-intervention coordinator.

A Sidney native, Jonas graduated from the University of Nebraska at Kearney in 2006 with a bachelor's degree in education and elementary endorsement.

From UNK, she received a master's degree in education administration pre-kindergarten through eighth grade in 2011 and a 7-12 education administration endorsement in 2012.
