She applied for the position and got the job.

As coordinator, Rossell will recruit new mentors, organize fund raisers and submit reports and records to the state organization.

Rossell will also train new mentors and be in the TeamMates office in the high school weekly.

She said she likes the local TeamMates program because it's a way for people in the community to be more connected to the school.

For example, many mentors attend the fine arts and sports activities of their mentees.

The former high school social studies teacher said she wanted the job because she loves kids.

"And I wanted to give back to the community," Rossell said.

Although she doesn't plan any changes initially, Rossell said mentors are needed, especially males.
