### **Cozad's new rescue unit is 'state-of-the-art'**

**COZAD**—The Cozad Volunteer Fire Department and Rescue Unit have received a brand new 2013 state-of-the-art Chevy Ambulance, with all the bells and whistles, that will become their priority emergency vehicle for ambulance service. The sirens are high tech as well as the LED lights on the new unit, and showcases more organized storage and is an overall very safe vehicle with cameras on all sides. It also has a high visibility color, and in case of severe weather, there are electric chains that can be put on the rear wheels while in motion.—reported in the Tri-City Trib.

Due to the efforts of fellow veterans and volunteers, the stone was set in time for the 2013 Memorial Day service.—reported in the Custer County Chief.

### **Visitors asked to be mindful of bird species**

**OGALLALA**—With the Memorial Day weekend, visitors to Lake McConaughy State Recreation Area were asked to be mindful of protected birds nesting on beaches. Visitors were asked to stay out of areas that were marked by warning signs and remain behind fences that protect

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nesting areas. There also is a requirement that pets be leashed. Disturbance or harassment of protected species by humans or pets is a violation of the federal Endangered Species Act with fines up to \$100,000 and a year in jail.—reported in the Keith County News.

**CALLAWAY**—Members of the Nebraska State Patrol apprehended a carload of suspects in Dawson County in connection with a break-in at the All Points convenience store in Callaway recently. Some late-night fishermen cleaning their catch noticed a suspicious vehicle pulled up next to the pop vending machines at the store, then moved south to the maintenance bay doors

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when one suspect broke out the east door with a rock. The activity set off the building alarm scaring off the suspects.
