Curtis auctioneer is first-ever woman champ

CURTIS—Regina Andrijeski of Curtis won State Champion in Auctioneer on Sept. 2 at the State Fair in Grand Island. She is the first female in Nebraska history to win the title. The competition was a live auction where each competitor had to sell three items. Andrijeski placed in the top ten and then had two interviews followed by selling three more items. She began auctioneering school in September of 2005, and won her first contest in 2007, followed by rookie of the year in 2009. She will now go on and represent Nebraska in July of 2014 at Internationals Auctioneer Champion in Kentucky at the National Auctioneers Convention.—reported in the Frontier County Enterprise.
