DC Sheriff's office recovers over 400 items

COZAD—Dawson County Sheriff Gary Reiber reports that over 400 items, including lots of hand and power tools, have been recovered. Unfortunately, Reiber said that theft reports do not match the items, which have been found. Reiber is asking resident in the region to check their properties closely. These items may have been stolen and even the owners may not be aware of the circumstances. If thefts of tools are discovered, residents are asked to notify the Sheriff's office. Broken Bow residents vote 'yes' for Keno

BROKEN BOW—The vote is in, 169 to 128. Broken Bow City Council members asked the question recently and there were enough votes to count. The community will be allowed to operate Keno within its city limits. Of the 2,615 Broken Bow residents registered to vote, 11 percent, or 317 made the trip to the Municipal Building to cast a ballot. Callaway to get students from Oconto

CALLAWAY—At 8:29 p.m. on Monday, Dec. 14, members of the Callaway Board of Education voted unanimously to close Oconto Attendance Center at the end of this school year with little fanfare and no acrimonious debate. The district will now begin the process of closing the school including the disposition of building and contents. Those families who do not opt into other districts will begin sending their children to Callaway School next August. The decision to close the building was made to help facilitate a savings of \$175,000 in operating expenses as well as probable cuts in state aid in the coming years.—taken from the Callaway Courier.
