Grand Generation fund drive successful

COZAD—A \$20,000 fund-raising campaign for the Cozad Grand Generation Center has been successful, and is nearing completion. Drive chairman Roger Boerkircher said contributions had been substantial and more are expected before the drive officially ends. The center had faced a recent funding shortage due to maintenance costs, past-due employee tax expenses and some building maintenance costs. Contributions will continue to be accepted at the center.—reported in the Tri-City Trib.

BROKEN BOW—Broken Bow head football coach Mike Garner has been recognized by Huskerland Preps as the Class C-1 Mike Berens Coaching Award recipient. This is the second year the award has been presented and honors one coach in each class for an outstanding season's work. Keith County is targeted for the 2010 Census

OGALLALA—With the 2010 Census on the horizon, Keith County has been targeted for a more complete count because of the low-response rate from residents during the 2000 Census, according to Vic Gentry, local Census office manager for the U.S. Census Bureau. Gentry, who will be headquartered at North Platte, has made it a point to improve the count in Keith County, which finished with a 57-percent response rate during the 2000 Census. For each person not counted, the state loses \$1,114 in revenue.—reported in the Keith County News.

Whooping Cough found in southwest Nebraska

CURTIS—Southwest Nebraska Public Health Department has recently investigated a case of whooping cough. It is important to know the signs and symptoms and to get appropriate treatment. Whooping cough can make a person cough for several minutes at a time with a “whooping” sound when breathing in. Stopping breathing is one of the dangers associated with the germ, which is highly contagious and can last on-and-off for up to three months. Department officials urge awareness, vaccinations and medical attention.—reported in the Frontier County Enterprise.

Rose Parade float to honor Arnold man

ARNOLD—An Arnold family’s story is to come alive in a Floragraph as one of 77 organ donors who will be featured on the “New Life Rises” float design at the 121st annual Rose Parade in Pasadena, CA, on New Years’ Day, 2010. Thomas “Moose,” son of Tiff and Barb Varney was just 21-years old when his life was tragically lost, but he had given the gift of life to others through his decision of organ donation. His picture will be made into a floragraph and displayed on a float. A floragraph is an artistic, life-like portrait created with organic materials including flowers that are pureed in blenders then used to “paint” the portrait.—reported in the Arnold Sentinel.
