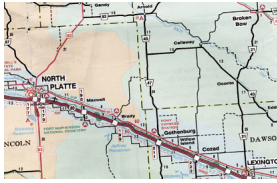

Wind farm turbines set to arrive in Bow

BROKEN BOW—Sempra U.S. Gas & Power announced that the first shipment of turbine components were scheduled to arrive at the Broken Bow II laydown yard in Custer County during the last week of March. The laydown yard is located 6.5 miles northeast of Broken Bow, about half a mile from the wind farm site. Additionally, the company announced that Blattner Energy, a power generation engineering, procurement and construction (EPC) contractor, has been awarded the contract to design and construct the 75-MW wind farm. The G.E. 1.7-megawatt wind turbine components would arrive by semi-truck from the east on Highway 70, travel north onto County Road 444, then east on Road 803 to the laydown yard.—reported in the Custer County Chief.
