Mary Clark will be the first to admit she is a demanding person.

She sets her expectations high in her English classroom, at home on the farm and now on the volleyball court.

Clark has taken over the reigns as head coach for the Swedes this season.

Although it's her first head coaching position, Clark is not new to the coaching scene. She served as assistant varsity coach at Minden and Lexington St. Ann's earlier in her teaching career as well as leading freshman teams and junior high girls at Gothenburg.

"I have a genuine love for the game of volleyball," Clark said. "I want the girls to see that and develop that but I'm also hoping to build disciplined mechanics."

Actually, she's not hoping for the mechanics, she is demanding it.

"Volleyball is a game of discipline," she said, "both mentally and physically. You not only have to get the movements right but you have to be in the right mental state too."

So far, she said, the attitude and work ethic has been outstanding.

“The girls have really pulled together as a team,” Clark said, “and I think they are willing to fill certain roles.”

Players may not land in the same roles they’ve played before.

“We are probably going to push the number of substitutes we’re allowed each game because we’ve got a lot of position players,” the coach said. “You will see very few girls play all the way around the rotation.”

The Swedes have seven returning letter winners to build around including four with Swede all-time Top 10 statistical spots and one all-conference first-team player.

Emily Max led Gothenburg at the net last fall with 139 kills and 66 stuff blocks.
