

Experience should help Swede volleyball team get over hump

They also leave a bitter sting that Clark hopes will fuel this year's more mature Swede players.

The Swedes lost a handful of graduates from last year's 12-18 season.

Clark thinks her 10 returning letter winners come back stronger, smarter and focused on a complete package.

"The girls have really worked hard on speeding up the tempo of our game and, at the same time, have concentrated on making good passes so we have an opportunity to run some options," Clark said.

In addition to four-year starter Jacey Wiggins, Clark said she will use Aryn Meisinger and Rachel Rice in a combined role for the other setting position of the Swedes' 6-2 offense.

She said that allows Wiggins to take over the right side of the net when she's in the front row as well as utilize her setting skills.

Middle hitters Regan Geiken and Tiani Reeves should be formidable forces at the net.

"Regan has really stepped up in that position," Clark said. "She plays so smart. And Tiani is always going to be a factor at the net."

Add the quickness of Taylor Mroczek around the entire rotation and important roles filled by Maddy Costello and Tylyn Haynes and the Swedes have a complete package, Clark said.

"We are demanding perfection on our passing," she said. "That's the only way we're going to be able to effectively get anything done on offense. We're working to really solidify the defense too by being disciplined in our positions and we've made a definite improvement in serving."

It has taken time and patience from the girls and the coaches, she said, but the unity is finally falling into place.

"I love the passion these girls have for the game and the way they play with heart," Clark said. "I believe they're capable of playing with and beating anyone."

The Swedes open the season at home on Thursday hosting Broken Bow.
