The Swedes didn't find much of a rhythm until the second set and even then struggled with serve receive.

"Ogallala has aggressive serves," Clark said. "We didn't do a good job of passing so the rest of our game didn't fall together."

The Indians took the sub-district championship with a 25-13, 27-25, 25-15 victory.

"I think if we just could have gotten that second set we might have built some momentum," the coach said.

Reeves led the way at the net again with nine kills and five blocks, including one stuff.
