

Gothenburg's girls allowed Valentine little breathing room the whole game on Friday, keeping defensive intensity high through all four quarters.

It's a strategy Swede basketball coach Chris Lecher has been pushing from the first day of the season.

"We stressed that we really wanted to go after them and keep them on their heels," Lecher said of the Badgers.

It worked.

The Swede girls downed the Badgers 49-26, extending their winning streak to nine games.

After a 2-2 start with the first couple possessions, the Swedes burst ahead with a 12-0 run in the first quarter, ending the period with a 16-6 advantage.

Gothenburg junior Regan Geiken had 10 of her game-high 14 points in the first quarter to lead the way.

The Swedes continued their surge through the second period to build a comfortable 28-14 lead at halftime.
