Work done by five advanced computer students at Brady High School has earned the district its own Apple iPad.

Members of the ESU 10 Technology Education Challenges in High Schools (TECHS) team recognized the Brady project as best out of projects from 26 schools in Nebraska.

The awards were announced during an end-of-the-year video conference in April.

ESU10 TECHS director John Stritt said the Brady Project was chosen based on audio quality, topics found valuable within an educational setting, participation of all class members and the report summarizing the intentions of the project.
