"The guys team is a really young group, so I look for them to progress and get better as meets continue," Reeves said.


He said he was happy with the way the boys competed but the runners need to work on bunching together.


Heading into the Lexington Invite on Tuesday (yesterday) Reeves wanted to see how his teams would hold up physically from the Cozad Invite.
